## Thank You to the DeVos Foundation:

As you know, we've had some amazing investments made to NMU from supporters this year. I'm honored to share news of a \$2 million gift from the Daniel and Pamella DeVos Foundation. Half of this gift will be added to the permanent endowment of the DeVos Art Museum, ensuring its continued excellence. The remainder will be directed toward a fund aimed at advancing programs and facilities related to the development of an NMU arts district that I think will be transformative for NMU and the surrounding Marquette communities. Dan was a member of the Board of Trustees from 1995-2002 and chair his final year. We sincerely thank Dan and Pamella.

## **Giving Day**

Northern's recent Giving Day on April 18, themed "Give to What You Love," was a success, surpassing our goal of \$125,000 with gifts totaling \$168,492 from 355 donors. Thank you to all who gave.

# **Schultz Family Foundation Scholarships:**

Speaking of giving and receiving, 33 students were recently selected from 150+ applications for the first cohort of the new Schultz Family Foundation First-Generation Empowerment Scholarship. The award, worth up to \$15,000 per year for up to four years, is geared toward first-generation students. This new program is part of the \$1 million gift made to NMU this fall by Howard Schultz, Class of '75, and his wife Sheri Kersch-Schultz. From what the Admissions staff has told me, calls made to the chosen students generated cheers and grateful tears. We are so thankful to the Schultz Family Foundation for their support.

## **Lansing Testimony**

Last week, I joined a team of NMU students, alumni and administrators to give Northern's testimony to the Michigan Legislature's House Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee. I went very well and our information about NMU was received by the legislators.

I want to publicly recognize and thank **Emma Gariepy**, a senior forensic biochemistry major and **Ben Klossner**, a junior mechanical engineering technology major, who presented along with me and alumni **Lexi Hagin**, a 2024 business management graduate and new executive director of the Menominee Business Development Corporation and **Troy Morris**, a 2016 psychology/behavior analysis graduate and co-founder/CEO of the aerospace and space logistics company Kall Morris Inc. of Marquette.

Additionally, we had another nine students who hail from the subcommittee member's districts who shared their stories via a series of printed cards. Their stories are compelling as well, so we've provided you with a set of the cards, along with two other documents that we included in our packets to the legislators – a "50 Hot Jobs" poster that demonstrates NMU having an academic program related to ALL 50 of the state's identified highest demand jobs through 2032 and a poster with NMU economic impact information on one side and a list of NMU alumni around the state who have recently been recognized for their professional endeavors.

To the legislators, I provided an enrollment update, highlighting Northern's third consecutive year of overall growth; talked about the measurable impact the state's Michigan Achievement Scholarship and Growing Your Own teacher education programs are having on NMU, thanked the Legislature for its support last year of NMU's cold case program, and gently reminded them of our hope to keep the Northern Enterprise capital outlay project moving forward in the coming months.

## A Student Recognition – 3-Minute Thesis:

Since the board was last on campus, NMU held its 3-Minute Thesis competition with graduate students and McNair scholars presenting their original research in only three minutes, in a language appropriate to a non-specialist audience, and with only one static PowerPoint slide.

The graduate student winner was Kaylee Mercer who presented "The Impact of Social Anxiety on Neural Responsiveness to Social Reward Through Social Media and Problematic Social Media Use." As our winner, she recently competed at the Midwest Association of Graduate Schools 3MT competition.

The McNair Scholars winner was Trinity Valentin for "Evaluating Variation in Aboveground Biomass of Industrial Hemp Using an Integration of Field and Remote-Sensing Methods."

**Rooftop Solar Grant** – Northern received a \$100,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development to install a rooftop solar array on top of our WellBeing Center. Two student teams were involved in writing and submitting the project proposal. The design of the project is scheduled to be done in late fall with construction taking place next summer.

**Rural Health Recognized** – The NMU Center for Rural Health received this year's Nonprofit of the Year Award from the Upper Peninsula Economic Development Alliance. The Center has solidified more than \$2.3 million in funding for health-related projects and workforce development initiatives over the past four years. Congratulations to Director Elise Bur and the Center's staff.

Welles Honored – Some of you know campus canine celebrity Welles, who is the loyal service dog for NMU Veteran Services Coordinator Mike Rutledge. Welles was recently awarded the 2025 Silver Tag Award from UPAWS at its annual gala, recognized for his longtime service and for his "comforting and supportive presence" on campus and in the community. We want to thank Welles and his partner Quinn, as well as our very active WildPups contingent, for the support they provide our campus. Congratulations, Welles.

A happy 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary to the NMU Social Work Department, which recognized this milestone in March with a series of events.

In April, as part of NMU's 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration, the departments of theatre and dance and communication and media studies collaborated on the production of "30 Years Later: Remembering Haywire" which was really enjoyed by those who attended.
