“Believe it or not, this all got started back when a group of alumni from Lower Michigan wanted to come back to Marquette for Homecoming. It was the late 1950s, I was teaching in Battle Creek at the time. I got a list of names of alumni who lived downstate from the registrar’s office. I sent out 300 penny postcards, arranged a caravan and we headed north for the festivities. About a year later, Dr. Edgar Harden, president of Northern at the time, called and asked if I would be interested in returning to Northern to start an alumni relations program. Keeping alumni connected to Northern has been a lifelong commitment for me.”

So says Tom Peters, the first director of Alumni Relations at Northern Michigan University.

“We knew that Northern needed to be involved in outreach. We

needed to know where our alumni were and what they were doing. It was really important in the early days to have events that allowed people to get together. We wanted them to feel a part of the Northern family.”

That mission continues today.

“The biggest change, I think, has been in communication. It has gotten so much better over the years. In addition to the university doing a better job communicating, the communication tools have changed and that makes it so much easier to stay connected.

“But while much has changed over the years, it also remains remarkably the same. Everyone who attended Northern, whether it was in the ‘50s or the ‘90s, had a very positive experience. When they reminisce about their time on campus, they have good feelings. They speak fondly of professors. They speak very highly of their education. The friends they made on this campus have remained their closest friends. They share a passion for this institution.

“I am proud that what we started back in the ‘50s has been so successful. We were a very small family at the time. Now we’re a large family. But we’re still family. No matter where we go or what we do—we’re the Northern family.”
