Dr. Lisa Poupart is a tribal citizen of Lac du Flambeau Band of Lake Superior Anishinaabe. She obtained a Ph.D. in Justice Studies from Arizona State University and is now an associate professor of Humanistic Studies, First Nations Studies and Womens Studies at University of Wisconsin - Green Bay.

Dr. Poupart is concerned with internalized oppression in American Indian communities and social problems that stem from this including domestic violence, addictions, childhood sexual abuse, and juvenile delinquency.
