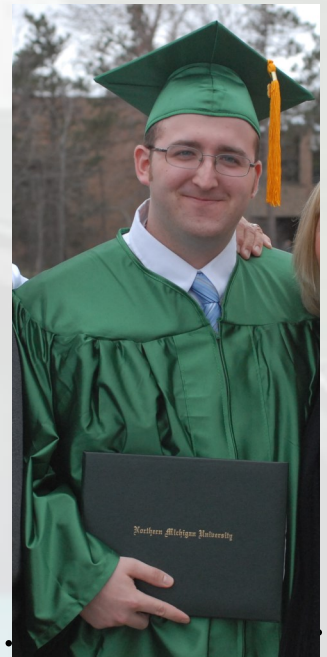

A Tragic Loss



As some of you may already know, our community suffered a terrible loss on Wednesday, 16 December. Dr. David Lucas, long-time head of the Physics Department passed away unexpectedly.

It is truly rare in life that you come across someone that is universally loved and respected..., but we did.

Dr. Lucas had an incredible career (although way too short):

As a husband

As a father

And as an educator, administrator, coach, ambassador, adviser, musician and friend.

His son, Evan, is an alum from NMU's Construction Management program (2011), and is employed by Rockford Construction Company in Grand Rapids, MI.

We have a sincere and heartfelt sorrow for Evan, his wife (Ashley), his mother (Marsha) and his brothers—Alex and Adam (wife Kelsey).

There are very few students (over the last 15 years) from Construction Management that did not have some form of positive interaction with Dr. Lucas. He treated every student, from every major, with dignity and respect. And...he was willing to do anything he could to inspire them, and help them achieve their goals. That's not to say Physics magically became easy, but he did everything he could to help every student. He understood that Physics was not a strength for a lot of our students, and he continued to help them until the 16th of December,

Multiply his impact by the thousands of students he has helped through the years, and you have a man that gave so much more than he ever received. He has taught construction professionals, dentists, doctors, physicists, veterinarians and countless other scientists.

The NMU Community has lost a gem. He exemplified leaving things better than he found them.
