MOST COMMON WAYS OF OBTAINING PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE

Internship

The typical internship is a one-time work or service experience, usually involving students who have attained considerable academic preparation related to a professional field or college/university major. The objectives and practices of an internship "experience" can vary from employer to employer. Some internships simply involve observing what a career field is "really like," while others are designed to be a "capping" experience permitting students to apply the principles and theory taught on campus to real world experiences.

Some internships are paid; others are not. Some organizations provide their interns with a "stipend," (a set sum of money) each week or month, instead of a salary. Sometimes room and board or travel expenses are included along with the stipend. Many students can receive some form of academic credit for their participation in an internship. If you are interested in obtaining academic credit for an internship experience, check with your academic advisor or an academic department head prior to your participation, to find out if you qualify. Internships usually involve advanced undergraduate students, graduate students, and more and more frequently, recent college/university graduates.

Cooperative Education

Cooperative education is usually an institution-based program that provides students multiple work assignments related to the academic and career interests of the participants. Virtually all co-op assignments are paid, and the experience involve productive work for the employer rather than observation or school-designed activities. It's called cooperative education because both the school and the employer cooperate in providing this opportunity for student learning.

Summer Hire

Many public and private organizations plan for the employment of college students over the summer months, in what is usually referred to as a "summer hire" program. Formalized summer hire programs are typically well organized and provide students with excellent opportunities to obtain work experience. Almost all of these summer hire positions are paid. Many employers often encourage students to return each summer while they continue their college careers.

Graduate Assistantship

Many colleges and universities offer graduate students the opportunity to work on campus as they pursue an advanced degree. Graduate assistants often teach entry-level college courses, pursue research, or perform administrative functions. Graduate assistantships usually provide a stipend.

Fellowship

Undergraduate and graduate fellowships are unique opportunities that often combine academic study with valuable field or research experience. Fellowships are available with many educational institutions, governmental agencies, public and private non-profit organizations, and corporations. Most fellowships provide some kind of salary or a stipend. Fellowships are available in the education field, the sciences, arts and humanities, and many other fields.

Other Methods of Gaining Practical Career Related Experience

Other valuable ways of obtaining career-related experience can include such things as on-campus or off-campus part-time employment, job shadowing, or volunteer work.

RECOMMENDED INTERNSHIP SEARCH STRATEGIES

- **Check out the internship postings on Handshake**
Current internships are posted to Handshake. Log in via MyNMU – Student Services tab and search by major, job title, location, etc.
- **Sign up for search alerts**
Handshake enables you to receive alerts based on your desired search criteria. In [Handshake](#), click on “Jobs” on the top menu and choose your search criteria. (If you are looking specifically for Federal Work-Study positions, click on ‘Filters’ on the right, then choose “Work Study” under “Job Type.”) When you have the job search that you would like to save/get notifications, click “Show result.” When you see the list of jobs that fit your criteria, click on “Save your search” on the left in the middle of the screen. You can then choose to “Edit your notifications” to change your search title name, choose how to get notified, and how often you’d like to get notified.
- **Sign up/stop in for an on-campus interview**
Employers regularly visit Northern Michigan University each year to interview for a variety of positions including internship, co-op and summer jobs. View the “Events” schedule on the Career Services web site (www.nmu.edu/careerservices) and if you meet the major and class requirement established by the interviewer, sign up for an interview. In some instances, employers also offer walk-in interviews. Additional interview opportunities are listed in [Handshake](#).
- **Attend a job fair**
Plan to attend one of the numerous job fairs scheduled throughout the year. Employers who participate in these events recruit for internship, cooperative education and summer hire positions. All upcoming job fairs are listed on the Career Services web site (www.nmu.edu/careerservices), click on “Events” and you’ll see an updated list of the year’s job fairs.
- **Seek individualized assistance**
If you would like to discuss your own search for an internship, fellowship, co-op or summer job, set up an appointment to meet with a representative of Career Services. Through partnership arrangements with state and Federal agencies (such as the Bureau of Land Management, the National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, etc.), as well as other natural resource management organizations, the Student Conservation Association (SCA) provides current students and recent graduates with professional-level experience in a wide variety of career fields. Each year, SCA works to place more than 1500 resource assistants with organizations throughout the U.S. and Canada. Enjoy an expense-paid internship (some with additional stipends and benefits) with SCA. Interns work in a wide variety of fields: Archaeology, Endangered Species Protection, Interpretation, Marine Biology, and Wilderness Patrol. Placement is available in many other positions also.
